First Annual Ohio Hope Squad Conference a Hit!

Ohio Hope Squad of the Month:

Milford High School

Implementing Hope Squad was both a personal, and professional mission of our superintendent, Nancy House. Milford has a history of being ahead of the curve with regards to mental health supports and services, and Hope Squad is yet another manifestation of the degree of commitment we have to our students' mental and emotional wellbeing. In addition to our partnership with two on-site mental health agencies, we hired our own mental health provider in the winter of 2018 to coordinate the district's mental health services, engage in crisis intervention/conduct risk-assessments, and oversee the successful implementation of Hope Squad at Milford High School.

In the fall of 2018, we officially launched as a Hope Squad school. As part of our kickoff, we had our Hope Squad members announced and introduced at our homecoming pep-rally in front of the entire student body. They were recognized for their trustworthiness, honesty, kindness, reliability, and character. This helped open the pathway for students to identify and approach our Hope Squad members when they need support, and it served as an experiential reminder for our Hope Squad members of their value within the school/among their peers.

Part of being a Hope Squad member at Milford requires being visible, available, and engaged with peers. We kept this in mind when designing our Hope Squad shirts, which display a large life-preserver with our eagle wings on the back, as well as a personalized last name on each shirt. This has assisted our Hope Squad members in being easily identified by their peers, while reinforcing a sense of unity, teamwork, and dedication among members.

Since the launch of our Hope Squad, we have worked diligently to ensure that our Hope Squad is engaged both at the school, and community level. We set up and ran a free gift- wrapping table at our local Christmas craft show that hosts thousands of attendees. This was a great opportunity to further inform the public/community about our Hope Squad, and for our students to serve the community in a unique way.

Most recently, our Hope Squad set up a table at our senior night basketball game where they handed out MHS Hope Squad bracelets, as well as flyers with information on Hope Squad, and crisis hotline and text-line information to the public. Our attending Hope Squad members were recognized in front of a large audience during half-time, and they were able to interact with fellow students and the public to promote suicide awareness and prevention!

We have seen great activity and utilization with this program, and since November of 2018, our Hope Squad members have already provided support and/or interacted with over 120 different students. Hope Squad goes beyond suicide prevention, it helps establish a community that supports mental health while destigmatizing mental illness, it spreads kindness and compassion, it is a lifeline to those in need, and serves as a beacon of hope to those who may be suffering in silence. At Milford High School, our students have embodied what it is to be a Hope Squad member, and we look forward to seeing their continued growth, success, and active engagement within the school and community!
